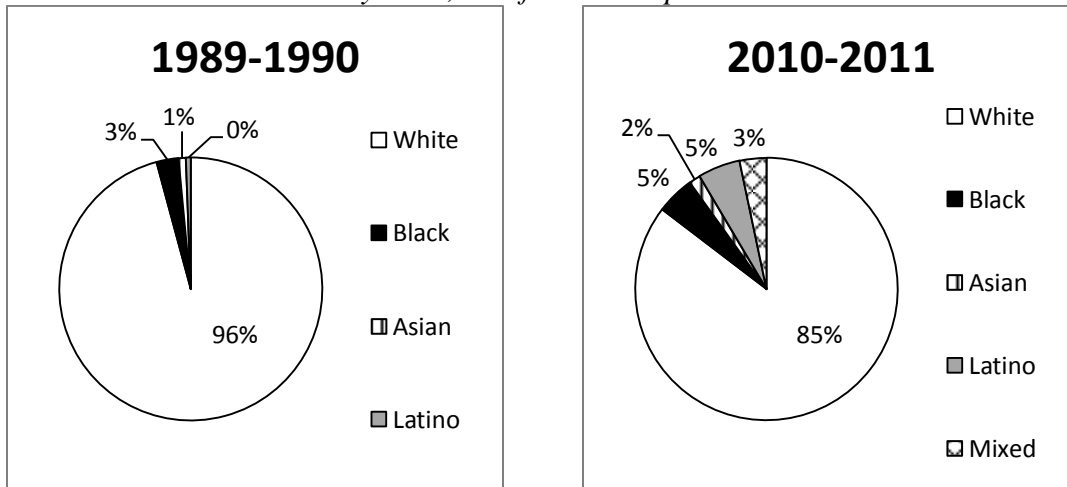


Pittsfield Metropolitan Area¹

- The white share of enrollment decreased from 1989-1990 to 2010-2011, while black, Asian, Latino, and mixed all increased.

- Overall enrollment increased from 1989-1990 to 1999-2000 but then decreased from 1999-2000 to 2010-2011.
- Enrollment in urban schools has been consistently higher than enrollment in suburban schools, though both have decreased since 1999-2000.

¹ This report includes only data from the districts in this metropolitan area that are located in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The 1999 MSA boundaries included Berkshire County.

- White enrollment in both urban and suburban schools decreased. In urban schools, the white share of enrollment decreased from 92.8% in 1989-1990 to 75.7% in 2010-2011, and in suburban schools, the white share decreased from 97.6% in 1989-1990 to 93.3% in 2010-2011.
- Black enrollment in urban schools almost doubled from 5.4% in 1989-1990 to 10.1% in 2010-2011. Black enrollment in suburban schools increased from 1989-1990 to 1999-2000 but then decreased from 1999-2000 to 2010-2011.
- Asian enrollment, though still a small proportion, decreased from 1989-1990 to 1999-2000 but then increased from 1999-2000 to 2010-2011 in both urban and suburban schools.
- Latino enrollment, particularly in urban schools, has increased dramatically. The Latino share of enrollment increased from 0.6% in 1989-1990 to 8.0% in 2010-2011 in urban schools and from 0.5% in 1999-2000 to 1.8% in 2010-2011 in suburban schools.
